

National Wildlife Federation Habitat Steward Training - 2014

Habitat Steward Training is a National Wildlife Federation® program which educates individuals on multiple aspects of the environment, with an intense focus on creating certified wildlife habitats in various landscapes.



This 24 hour training program provides access to reference materials Habitat Stewards can use to continue their education, as well as local contacts who are experts in their fields.

Training includes, but is not limited to:

- Creating wildlife habitats at residences, businesses, schools and places of worship
- Native plants and their value to wildlife
- Invasive plants in our area and the threats they pose
- Wildlife: endangered species, habitats, local
- How to do presentations on Creating Certified Wildlife Habitats
- Local volunteer opportunities to put your knowledge to use
- Soil types and water problems
- A look at local and state environmental challenges
- Information on related programs
- Concord Community Wildlife Habitat project

In addition to 24 hours of classroom training, Habitat Stewards are required to complete 30 hours of service within one year of completing training. All service hours will be devoted to Concord Wildlife Alliance.
